Mayor Wendelin called the Work Session/Informal meeting to order at 7:00 pm and the pledge of allegiance was recited.

### **DISCUSSION ITEMS**

#### **Capital Improvement Plan (CIP) Airport List**

Diane Hoffer with Olsson & Associates gave an update for the planned 17/30 runway capital projects to begin in the spring of 2016. This is to include an 800 ft extension to be added on the south end of the runway.

After a discussion regarding both runways and what is needed and necessary, it was agreed upon between the Council and the Airport Committee that the top priority was seal coating the asphalt on Runway 17/30. Diane Hoffer recommends applying for both the KDOT and the FAA for funding. The KDOT funding is more suitable for grading the 12/30 grass runway and the FAA funding for the seal coating and either a turnaround or a taxiway for the 17/30 runway. It was decided to apply for the turnaround and keep the taxiway on the list for future grants. For now the projects would be applied for at both the FAA and the KDOT with a 90% grant and 10% city matching. Applications are due September of 2016

#### **City's Debt Schedule**

City Treasurer Steve Zodrow presented a brief synopsis of the City Debt Schedule and the Water Fund Cash Projections that were presented to the Council at the November 4<sup>th</sup> meeting. He introduced two versions of how the water rate ordinance for the proposed 20% rate increase. The first version used the format currently used by the City. The second version presented a different approach that eliminated the customer service separate charge and introduced rates for multi-family dwelling units.

Zodrow introduced a sewer fund cash flow worksheet projecting the following:

- 1) No Rate Change
- 2) 10% rate increase starting in 2016
- 3) 20% rate increase starting in 2016

He plans to present a combined water/sewer rate Ordinance for the Council to consider for approval at the next meeting.

Also introduced by Mr. Zodrow and City Administrator Pete Kampfer, was an Ordinance establishing a “Solid Waste Refuse Franchise Fee and Permit Fees” for 4% of its monthly total gross receipts for all accounts. The purpose of the fee is to supplement funding for code enforcement and debris removal from the City.

### **Oberlin Committee and Board Member’s Handbook**

Administrator Kampfer presented a handbook as a reference for those residents who volunteer to serve on one of Oberlin’s advisory bodies. Mr. Kampfer explained the Mayor does the appointing of the committee members.

### **City Entrance Sign Enhancements (Alka Seltzer Sign)**

After a discussion, it was decided the sign did need a facelift but to leave it as is, as much as possible with the exception of adding a flagpole and flag.

At 8:20, Mayor Wendelin declared the work session meeting closed and opened the Regular Meeting. He read a proclamation regarding Veteran’s Day that he had written.

### **Open Code Enforcement Public Hearing**

Oien moved, second by Addleman to close the regular meeting and open the Code Enforcement Public Hearing. **Motion carried.**

- **Consider Status – Resolution 695** setting forth a Public Hearing for certain properties that may be blighted, unsafe or dangerous: 703 E Oak. Show cause why said property should not be condemned, and ordered repaired or demolished, as reviewed on October 15, 2015.
  - Administrator Kampfer reported that according to Code Enforcement Officer Jan Ackerman, all requirements were met on the property of 703 E Oak.
- **Consider Status – Resolution 696** setting forth a Public Hearing for certain properties that may be blighted, unsafe or dangerous: 214 S Buffalo. Show cause why said property should not be condemned, and ordered repaired or demolished, as reviewed on October 15, 2015.
  - After a discussion, the Council indicated no decision would be made regarding the property since the owner could not attend, due to health. The Council then asked that Administrator Kampfer keep track of any additional changes at the residence.

At 8:30 Addleman moved, second by Marchello to close the code enforcement public hearing. **Motion carried.**

Oien moved, second by Horn to open the regular meeting again. **Motion carried.**

## **NEW BUSINESS**

### **Consider Midwest Energy Gas Franchise Tax Agreement with the City**

Bob Muirhead with Midwest Energy presented Ordinance No. 881 for consideration. This ordinance indicates a 4% fee of the gross revenue derived from the sales of natural gas within the City Limits and includes three changes from previous years.

- 1) The franchise agreement is for 20 years, subject to renegotiating the percentage to be paid to the City every five years.
- 2) There is language in the ordinance stating that if the City should annex any property, the City would notify Midwest Energy.
- 3) Previously this was a state statute process and now it is a standard ordinance.

Addleman moved, second by Oien to approve Ordinance No. 881 as presented. To be published and paid for one time by Midwest Energy after signatures are obtained. **Motion carried.**



Subject: Water/Sewer Rate Comparisons Discussion

Taken together, our studies reinforce the theme that every water and wastewater situation is unique. What do rates cover? What kind of rate structures are there? What are average rates across the country? What should our rates be?

The answer to the last question, we found out, is “it depends.” It depends on so many factors unique to each community—the number and physical distribution of customers, the local geography, the water source, or the physical condition of the existing plant and equipment, to name a few. While rate comparisons among communities with similar characteristics may be valid, comparing rates between vastly different situations is like comparing apples and oranges. It’s not a fair—or appropriate—comparison.

Dallas Post, American Water Works Association (AWWA) Small System program manager, sees little value in comparing rates for small systems. He said small systems are already under pressure to keep their rates in line with the rates charged by systems in neighboring communities — regardless of their individual costs.

Comparing rates would increase that pressure, he said. This could lead to a system failing to collect enough revenue to prepare for future renovation and expansion projects. “The message to smaller systems should be that they need to conduct in-depth studies to calculate rates, rather than base rates on averages,” Post said.

Water rates have historically been inexpensive when compared to other utilities, according to the AWWA, but recent information suggests that water rates will continue to increase faster than both inflation and average income growth.

### **Many Factors Lead to Higher Rates**

Local conditions influence whether a water system will have relatively high or low rates. These factors include the source of water (groundwater or surface water), system density (number of customers verses miles of water pipeline), and local geography (type of terrain).

A water system with high customer density and favorable topography may have inherently lower water rates. But many additional factors influence rates as well. These include:

- *inflation*;
- the need to expand or renovate a system;
- increased costs for water treatment due to new regulations or contamination;
- emergencies;
- the loss of a major water consumer, such as a factory, or other changes in the customer base;
- system management that permits delinquent accounts or inefficient operation.

Simply having an older or neglected water system can lead to higher maintenance and production costs, according to Siegel. A leaky network of distribution pipes, for example, forces a system to spend more for water treatment, he said. Replacing deteriorated pipe leads to improved efficiency and lower costs.

Post cited occasions when small communities use water system revenues to pay for other town expenses, such as street departments or parks.

“In smaller cities, a lot of times, the water utility has been used to supplement the cash flow and keep town taxes low,” Post said, adding that this increases the frequency and amount of water rate hikes.

**Subject:** Proposed Water Rate Ordinance

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Included in your packet is Proposed Ordinance No. 881 Establishing Water Rates. The changes in this proposal from the current ordinance are as follows:

1. I have combined the \$22.80 minimum fee with the customer service meter fee and renamed it "Base Service Fee per Meter". This change does not increase the rate from what customers are currently paying. It merely combines the two into one rate.
2. I have calculated what it would take to change the usage rate to cover the increase in revenues that is needed, a sort of debt surcharge, without creating a whole new charge to accomplish it. Based upon the expected annual volume of water sales we need an increase of \$11.97 per thousand cubic feet of water sold. I have made this the base charge for water usage and then added that amount to the other two current rate tiers to come up with the new rates per thousand cubic feet of \$43.39 and \$46.20.

By structuring the rate increase in this manner it will actually give users under 500 cubic feet a break from applying a 20% rate increase across the board. Many of our elderly and lower income households use less than 500 cubic feet per month. It also places a heavier burden of the rate increase on larger users of water. I have attached a worksheet that demonstrates what a customer currently pays for water at various usages and what they would pay under a flat 20% rate increase and the proposed "debt surcharge" method.

3. I have also added sections for multi-family dwellings served through a single meter to place those types of dwellings on a more comparable rate system to that of single family dwellings. Currently they are billed on the exact same base charges and rate tiers as a single family dwelling. That gives them a break on the base charge as they are only paying for one, but penalizes them in the rate tiers as there are more users than there are in single family dwellings. The proposed ordinance provides some parity by increasing the base charge based upon the number of living units and then spreads out the rate tiers based upon the number of living units as well.

4. Water outside the corporate city limits are still set at 125% of the rates for water delivered within the city limits.
5. The proposed ordinance also sets a new rate for the City's bulk water station.

ORDINANCE NO. 881

AN ORDINANCE ESTABLISHING WATER RATES

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE GOVERNING BODY OF THE CITY OF OBERLIN, KANSAS, that

Section One: Water users within the corporate limits of the city shall pay for their use and consumption of water furnished or supplied by the city and obtained through each meter at the monthly rate of:

(a) Base Service Fee Per Meter:

Through 5/8 inch to 3/4 inch water meter	\$33.00
Through 1 inch water meter	\$39.80
Through 1 1/4 inch water meter	\$46.60
Through 1 1/2 inch water meter	\$53.40
Through 2 inch water meter	\$67.00
Through 3 inch water meter	\$80.60
Through 4 inch water meter	\$94.20
Through Fire Hydrant	\$39.80

For multi-family dwelling units with service through a single meter, excluding motels, hotels, mobile home parks and nursing homes the Base Service Fee Per Meter shall be the charge listed above for the respective meter size plus one half of the above listed charge times the number of dwelling units above one.

Example: Multi-family dwelling unit with four (4) living units served through a 2 inch water meter.  $\$67.00 + (\$33.50 \times 3) = \$167.50$

(b) Usage Fee Per Thousand Cubic Feet:

First 750 Cubic Feet	\$11.97
751 to 2,000 Cubic Feet	\$43.39
Above 2,001 Cubic Feet	\$46.20

For multi-family dwelling units with service through a single meter, excluding motels, hotels, mobile home parks and nursing homes the three rate tiers for the Usage Fee per Thousand Cubic Feet shall be multiplied by the number of living units being supplied by the meter and the cubic feet in each of the three rate tiers. The rate per thousand cubic feet shall remain the same for each of the three tiers.

Example: Multi-family dwelling unit with four (4) living units.

First 3,000 Cubic Feet	\$11.97
3,001 to 8,000 Cubic Feet	\$43.39
Above 8,001 Cubic Feet	\$46.20

(c) Water provided outside the corporate city limits of Oberlin shall be charged at a rate of 125% of the rates in sections 1(a) and 1(b).

(d) Water Delivered from the City's Bulk Water Distribution Station shall be charged at \$4.50 per 1,000 gallons.

ORDINANCE NO. 859

AN ORDINANCE ESTABLISHING WATER RATES

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE GOVERNING BODY OF THE CITY OF OBERLIN, KANSAS, that:

Section One: Water users of the city shall pay for their use and consumption of water furnished or supplied by the city at the monthly rate of \$22.80 for the first 750 cubic feet or any part thereof; from 751 cubic feet to 2,000 cubic feet, the rate will be \$31.42 per thousand cubic feet; from 2,001 cubic feet and above, the rate will be \$34.23 per thousand cubic feet. Water provided outside the city limits of Oberlin shall be charged at a rate of 125% of the above rates. Additionally, the following charges for water furnished or supplied by the city and obtained through each meter, or obtained for each separate property:


- a) Through 5/8ths inch to 3/4 inch water meters \$10.20;
- b) Through 1 inch water meters \$17.00;
- c) Through 1 1/4 inch water meters \$23.80;
- d) Through 1 1/2 inch water meters \$30.60;
- e) Through 2 inch water meters \$44.20;
- f) Through 3 inch water meters \$57.80;
- g) Through 4 inch water meters \$71.40.

Section Two. These rates shall be effective for the billings occurring on and after April 1, 2013, which includes usage during part of February and March.

Section Three. All ordinances in conflict herewith are hereby repealed.

Section Four. This ordinance shall take effect and be in full force from and after its publication in the official city newspaper.

**Revised Sewer/Waste Water Rate Ordinance 882**

I included in your packet for the last council meeting three cash flow projections for the sewer funds based upon the following assumptions:

- A. No rate change
- B. 10% rate increase starting in 2016
- C. 20% rate increase starting in 2016

The minimum end of year cash requirements are based upon the following definitions:

Operating Fund: Three months average expenses plus the debt service for the next year.

Reserve Fund: Lowest acceptable balance to build up to is \$1,000,000.

The results of these projections were as follows:

## A: No Rate Change

This projection showed that even with suspending transfers to the reserve fund that the operating fund balance will fall below the minimum desired balance by 2024. The \$1M desired minimum reserve balance cannot be achieved. All major capital outlays would have to come from the reserve funds further reducing the balance from the desired minimum.

## B: 10% Rate Increase in 2016

This projection showed that the operating fund remained above the accepted minimum balance and allows for decent transfers to the reserve fund. By 2025 the reserve fund has the potential to exceed the \$1M desired minimum by over \$150,000. The current sewer debt matures in 2026 which would then free up around \$100,000 per year to be transferred to the reserve fund. Major capital outlays up to 2025 would still have to be made from the reserve fund.

C: 20% Rate Increase in 2016

This projection showed that the operating fund remained above the accepted minimum balance and allows fairly substantial transfers to the reserve fund. The reserve fund could handle around a \$500,000 capital outlay expenditure and still achieve the \$1M minimum desired balance by 2025. The current sewer debt matures in 2026 which would free up and additional \$100,000 per year to be transferred to the reserve fund.

Also included was a sewer rates schedule that showed the current sewer rates and what the rates would be with a 10% and 20% increase.

Our current code for sewer rates dictates that sewer rates be reviewed annually and that sufficient rates are charged to properly finance the operation of the sewer system, service the debt and to pay for needed capital improvements. Based upon the analysis above, it is my recommendation that the council proceed with a 10% rate increase effective with the next sewer recalculation cycle.

Attached is proposed Ordinance No 882 reflecting a 10% increase for the sewer rate.

The minimum charge per month shall be \$15.95 for 300 cubic feet of water. For usage beyond the minimum charge, each contributor shall pay a user charge for operation and maintenance including replacement of \$3.25 per 100 cubic feet of water.

Section Two: All ordinances in conflict herewith are hereby repealed.

Section Three: This ordinance shall take effect with the March 2016 sewer rate calculation.

Included in your packet is Proposed Ordinance No. 883 Establishing Electric Rates.

With the total resident utility cost in mind and the fact that both the water rate and sewer rates must be increased to finance the cost of operating those systems we looked to see if rates could be reduced in any other area. Upon analysis, it was concluded that a \$0.0025 decrease in the electric rate would not currently put the electric fund in any financial peril. A rate reduction of this amount would reduce the electric fund revenue by about \$33,000 per year based off the current sales volume of electricity. On an average household bill assuming 900 kwh of usage, this rate reduction would yield a cost reduction for the customer of \$2.25 per month.

ORDINANCE NO. 883

AN ORDINANCE ESTABLISHING ELECTRICAL RATES

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE GOVERNING BODY OF THE CITY OF OBERLIN,


